


The Early Years Learning Framework defines playbased learning as 'a context for learning through which children organise and make sense of their social worlds, as they engage actively with people, objects and representations'.

What is play based learning?

- Intentionally designed activities
- Linked to curriculum learning outcomes
- Not incidental
- Used in Early Years Settings and Primary Schools

Benefits of play based learning

- **★** Language and literacy development
- **★**Social and Emotional Skills
- ★ Creativity and Imagination
- **★** Motor Skills



★ Confidence and a positive attitude towards learning

How does play connect to learning?

During the act of play children are:

- exploring
- taking risks
- engaging their imagination
- solving problems.

They are learning valuable skills that support social, physical and cognitive development-including literacy and numeracy skills.
